Instructions:

- 1. A few days before your visit, print out the checklist and the picture cards on the next pages to plan your trip to the Museum.
- 2. To help you decide where you want to go, read information about the different galleries to learn about the types of art in the Museum.
- 3. When you've decided which areas you want to visit, cut out the corresponding cards and attach them to your checklist.
- 4. You can also use other picture cards to say when you need to take a break, sit down, use the restroom, etc.
- 5. Be sure to leave some boxes on your checklist empty so you can add to your tour while you are at the Museum.
- 6. Bring your completed My Met Tour checklist with you to the Museum.
- 7. Print out a blank checklist and extra cards in case you want to create another checklist while you are at the Museum.
- 8. When you are at the Museum and have completed a stop on your tour, check it off with a pencil in the "All Done" column.


